She also volunteers her time as a Student Ambassador, helping at Edgewood College special events and activities such as Preview Day, when prospective freshmen and their parents can visit the college, meet professors and faculty, learn about admissions and financial aid, and ask questions of current Edgewood College students.

One of her favorite parts of being a Student Ambassador is giving tours to prospective freshmen. Benina likes spending time with the high school students and their parents as she gets to take them around the campus and “brag about Edgewood.”

While Benina knows she still has much hard work ahead of her, she is looking forward to becoming a part of Edgewood College’s nursing program and gaining real-world experience inside a hospital. After she receives her RN, she wants to

continue her education for a few more years and become licensed in anesthesiology.

Benina is excited for her career inside the hospital, but also has dreams of extending her work to the wider community. She hopes to someday be able to start some kind of social service organization, such as a homeless shelter.

Benina is very grateful that she could receive a Wisconsin Tuition Grant to help her get to Edgewood College. She says, “My mom is a single parent and the WTG helped a lot. It’s nice to know the State of Wisconsin offers that.”

As a freshman, Benina’s hardest lesson so far has been leaving her mother and living on her own, but she says everyone at Edgewood College has made her feel comfortable. She feels her new independence has already made her more prepared for whatever the future brings.

Kathleen appreciates the fact that “you can email a professor, and they know what student you are and who you are — that you’re not just another kid in the class. It’s a small campus; it doesn’t take you forever to get to class. It’s the sense of community here.”

She is the first person in her family to attend college, but her parents “always talked about how we should go to college so you can make your life better than theirs was. I was always a good student, so it was kind of expected.”

So far, Marian seems to agree with Kathleen. She earned a 4.0 grade point average in her first semester, majoring in middle–secondary education with a biology emphasis, with minors in environmental science and Spanish. Outside of class, she’s an active member of the Marian Student Education Association, the student affiliate of national, state and local education associations.

She is, interestingly, one of two students attending Marian who were selected for Badger Girls State the same year.

The Wisconsin Tuition Grant made it possible for Kathleen to attend Marian College, for which she is very grateful. She says she appreciates the fact that the grant helps her to pay for tuition so the college she wants is affordable.

Kathleen wants to study abroad at some point, with Spain or Italy on the top of her list. And after graduation? “I’ve always known that I wanted to teach,” she says. “I had great teachers in high school who influenced me. It’s something I feel passionate about.”
