Lakeland student prepares for a career in the nonprofit sector


As Lakeland University student Hailey Jester prepares for her final semester, she understands she is the sum of many parts of the Lakeland community.

"Lakeland has provided me the access to the people and experiences I needed to understand who I was in every aspect of my life," said the senior from Salem, Wisconsin. "Finding yourself sounds easy, but it's difficult to do. I thought I knew who I was coming into Lakeland. I'm happy in who I have become."

Hailey will be the first in her family to graduate from college. She is able to attend Lakeland thanks to her financial aid package, which includes a Wisconsin Grant and help from Lakeland itself.

A variety of experiences have played roles in shaping Hailey, who is majoring in business administration with emphasis areas in nonprofit and management and minoring in psychology. A member of Lakeland's softball team, Hailey said her coaches and teammates and the bond they have formed have also played a large role in her development. In addition, she worked on Lakeland's admissions team as a campus ambassador, giving tours and working with prospective students and their families, which further expanded her skill set.

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Hardworking, outgoing and talented, Noah is a 2016 graduate of Kiel High School, where he participated in show choir and where teachers fed his drive and passion for music. Silver Lake College, where he is a performance and pedagogy major, appealed to him because he was familiar with the quality of its music department. He also liked the college's small class sizes, where he wouldn't be just another face in the crowd, Noah said.

He credits the Wisconsin Grant for his decision to attend Silver Lake College. Financial aid, and the fact that the college is close to home, helped make it affordable for him. Noah believes so strongly in the Wisconsin Grant that he joined other students in the capitol for WAICU Students' Day, advocating for Wisconsin Grants.

"Thanks to the financial aid I received, I do not have to worry about major expenses and student loans after college. This, in turn, allows me to focus my time and effort into making the most of my education," Noah said.

"Silver Lake College music faculty members have encouraged me to pursue my dreams and work hard for them," he said. "They have given me tools that I will need to be successful later in my life and have helped me improve musically."

After graduation, Noah plans to teach in a high school and would eventually like to pursue his master's degree in vocal performance.


Lakeland has strong relationships with area employers, and Hailey completed two internships that have further molded her. Her first internship was in summer hospitality at a bed and breakfast. Her junior year, she worked as a marketing and events intern at American Orthodontics. It was designed to last a semester, but was such a success that the employer extended it to a year and gave her higher-level projects and experiences.

Even with her work and wide array of activities, Hailey will graduate a semester early, and she hopes to leverage what she has learned at Lakeland and her passion for people. She plans to join the Peace Corps and hopes to serve in the Eastern Caribbean, tutoring school children, helping teachers, and organizing community programming.

"I will get a lot out of it because children will get a lot out of it," Hailey said. "I am most concerned with how I am going to help them and how they are going to benefit from it. I am doing it for the children."

Hailey's career goal is to create a nonprofit organization that provides mental health services to homeless and low-income veterans and service men and women. A relative who served in the Vietnam War developed posttraumatic stress disorder and eventually committed suicide, and Hailey has since learned more about PTSD.

"That set the tone for me," Hailey said. "These are important services; they're needed."
