


# 4 reasons to support student financial aid opportunities

# Increases college enrollment among low-income students

The most economically disadvantaged Wisconsin high school students are 35 percentage points less likely to attend a baccalaureate college (4-year) than those who are not economically disadvantaged.

#### Reduces the burden of student debt

Wisconsin Grants awarded to Wisconsin students attending a Wisconsin private non-profit institution saved a total of <a href="https://www.sveta.com/overstate/">over \$215 million</a> in principal and loan interest.

#### Improves state attainment rates


College graduation rates among low-income students (i.e., Pell Grant recipients) in Wisconsin lag behind the graduation rates of higher-income students.

While Wisconsin's post-secondary attainment rate is approaching its goal of

60 percent by 2027, issues of equity and achievement gap still remain to be addressed.

#### Boosts state labor force participation rate

Investment in higher education is long-term, sustainable workforce development. Wisconsin education attainment is directly associated with labor force participation. Wisconsinites with a bachelor's degree and higher are 25 percent more likely to participate in the workforce than those with less education.
