Viterbo biology student looks forward to career in injury prevention




All to keep her dream alive of becoming a nurse practitioner.

She participated in a service trip to Minneapolis, which she praised as a "very different kind of learning experience." She works as a Voyager campus tour guide.

"I like connecting with people and showing them what Viterbo is like," she said. "I'm definitely an extrovert."

Elizabeth also serves as a tutor for anatomy and physiology classes.

"Being a tutor allows me to get to know more people on campus and help them be successful in their classes," she said. "I couldn't have taken those classes without a tutor, so it was good to give back in the same way."

Dr. Charlie Lawrence, a faculty member in the biology department, appreciates Elizabeth's work. "Liz is a great student and has been an excellent tutor," he said. "She is hardworking, very bright, and really connects with the students. Liz will be exceptionally successful as she continues to pursue her goals."

Off campus, Elizabeth teaches dance—her first love—at a local studio. It's something she has been doing since she was four years old, and she has a minor in dance at Viterbo. She would like to combine a degree in biology and with her love of dance into a career.

"I would love to develop a new injury prevention program for dancers," she said.

friends had at the non-profit university and learning that its new BSN program didn't have a waiting list.

She takes classes on campus and online, and also works at the campus library. She appreciates that Herzing understands and supports non-traditional students like her who have to juggle jobs and family. Herzing makes it easy with online classes and the way they schedule on-campus classes, she said.

"The staff is really amazing and professional," she said. "They're always encouraging you to do your best. When you're in an environment where they tell you 'You're smart, you can do it,' it inspires you and makes you feel like you can do those things." Also, professors are "really approachable," she said. Unlike other educational experiences she's had, "Here, I feel like I can ask any question and not be made to feel like I don't 'get it.'"

Her primary job is working as an LPN at Rock Haven nursing home on weekends. In addition to the Herzing campus position, she holds part-time jobs at UW Health as a student nurse assistant and at the Beloit School District as a fill-in health room assistant. She's also an officer in the Student Nurses Association at Herzing.
