MIAD student and veteran soars as NASA intern, creative problem-solver

David Gabriel does not fit the mold. He is a veteran. husband, and full-time Industrial Design student at the Milwaukee Institute of Art & Design (MIAD). He also interned at NASA.

As a kid, David dreamed of becoming an inventor working with planes and spaceships. After high school, he served in the Army and deployed twice to Afghanistan. During his time there, David was challenged to connect two communities so they could work together in times of crisis. Using only parachutes, rope, and pallets that had been dropped from helicopters in the night, David and his team built a bridge over the water between the two. This experience taught him that people are at the center of the solution, and led him to pursue a career in industrial design.

Last summer, David interned at NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center, working with the Human Factors Engineering Team. He worked on redesigning the kitchen area for Project Gateway, which is the space station that supports human exploration of the moon.

For his senior capstone project, he planned to design and build a full-scale interior of a lunar habitat, under the mentorship of NASA engineers and space architects. "It's based on human factors and design research. It's such an exciting thing to work on because there has never been a moon base before; this is all uncharted territory."

Then COVID-19 changed the world. MIAD's senior exhibition became virtual, and all of his plans had to change. "I taught myself how to bring my designs into virtual reality. I learned that creative problem solving is the ability to keep moving forward in less than ideal conditions," he said.

David is very appreciative for scholarships, the Wisconsin Grant, and other financial aid that have helped him to attend MIAD and soar to new heights, just like the projects he is creating.

"I've been really fortunate to be able to focus on school, and not worry as much about finances," David said.

He added, "The mentorship and education at MIAD empowered me to reach for things I never thought possible."

On campus, she works in the Office of Marketing and Communications and for the Department of Communication. She also holds many leadership positions in campus organizations. She currently is vice president and public relations chair of Ripon College Feminists. She also is a member of the Ripon Engagement Division; public relations chair of Greek Council; vice president-public relations for Kappa Delta sorority; and the 2022 class representative of COMMunity, Ripon College's communication club. She also works off campus at Kwik Trip.

"The connections I've made with both students and professors have really surprised me, in a good way," Zoe says. "I have made so many new friends, joined a sorority, and gotten to know my professors as well.

"The people I know have helped me both academically and emotionally, and I feel that they have made me a better student and a better person."

Relying on a strong financial package reduces the stress for Hazel, and this allows her to make the most out of her Ripon College experience. "I have a seasonal job, a year-round job, and an on-campus job, yet sometimes that still isn't enough to cover the entirety of tuition," she notes.

Sources like the Wisconsin Grant, that don't have to be repaid, are key for her. "The Wisconsin Grant helps keep me in school to get the education that I need while being in a place that I love," Zoe says.

"If I wasn't receiving this grant, I wouldn't be able to continue my education at Ripon College. My goal since I was little has been to graduate with a four-year degree, and I will be the first in my family to do so. Receiving the Wisconsin Grant means so much to me because it is helping me build a better future for myself and my family."
