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Lawrence Musician Ready to Lead

Growing up on a small dairy farm in rural Hammond, Ingrid Lestrud always knew she wanted the best college education she could afford.

Salutatorian of her graduating class at St. Croix Central High School, she attracted the attention of many outstanding institutions. With the help of a Wisconsin Tuition Grant, she was able to remain in state and pursue her interests in music and performing at Lawrence University's Conservatory of Music.

"I wouldn't be able to attend Lawrence without the Wisconsin Tuition Grant," says Ingrid, who has received a grant as part of her financial aid package each of the past four years.

Making the most of her

opportunity, Ingrid has spent almost as much of her undergraduate career on stage as she has in classrooms and rehearsal studios. A senior majoring in vocal performance with a 3.59 grade point average, Ingrid has performed in two major operas, Mozart's *The Marriage of Figaro* and Puccini's *Suor Angelica*, sung the part of Cleo in Frank Loesser's musical *The Most Happy Fella*, and portrayed Agafya in Lawrence's production of *Anna Karenina*.

These are the words of Jill Metrey, an Alverno student, wife, and mother. Jill had known for many years that she wanted to attend college, but was thwarted in her first go-round.

Jill was accepted to a Wisconsin university during her senior year in high school, but was unable to attend

because her family did not have the financial resources to fund her education. So Jill did what many others have to do in that situation – she found a job. Although she worked in a variety of environments, she found her jobs unsatisfactory.

During her four years between high school graduation and college, Jill married and started a family. After her daughter was born, her desire for a college education grew stronger.

"I always wanted to go to college, but after my daughter

concert choir the past four years and serves as the choir's rehearsal assistant.

Despite her busy schedule, Ingrid works two jobs to help supplement the Wisconsin Tuition Grant and a Lawrence alumni scholarship she receives to meet her college expenses. She spends six hours a week giving voice lessons and helping out as a rehearsal accompanist at Appleton West High School, and also sings with a local church choir twice a week.

As she looks to the future, Ingrid isn't ruling out a performance someday at the Metropolitan Opera in New York City. But if she makes it to that hallowed stage, it may be as a conductor, not a singer. As part of her bachelor of music degree requirements, Ingrid had to take a class on conducting. To both her surprise and delight, the class proved to be an epiphany. "Midway though the course, I became intensely

interested in conducting," said Ingrid. "I discovered conducting is even more intellectually challenging than singing."

She made her debut as a conductor in October, leading a 20-piece chamber orchestra in concert, and is scheduled to serve as assistant director of three performances of Lawrence's production of *The Mikado* in March.

Ingrid isn't sure where her career path will lead her, but she knows she'll embark upon it with an excellent foundation.

"I'm grateful for the many opportunities and experiences I've enjoyed at Lawrence. The Wisconsin Tuition Grant has certainly played a role in helping to make those opportunities possible for me," says Ingrid. "I feel I'm well prepared for whatever the future holds and am looking forward to making my mark."
