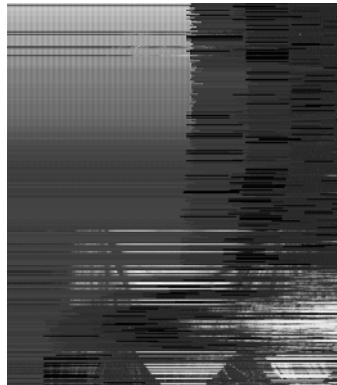

Tuition Grant and other aid, that dream has come true.

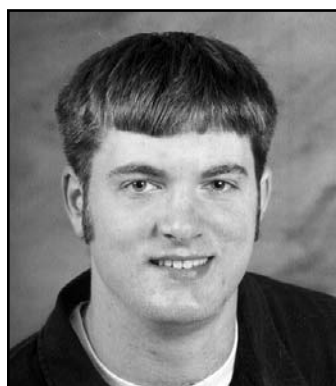

In addition, she is a member of the Edgewood Student Education Association and the Edgewood Honors Committee for the Honors Program. "I'm very happy to be here at Edgewood. Prior to entering Edgewood College in the fall of 1999, Amber graduated with honors a year early from Brodhead High School, where she was involved in cheerleading (as a captain), volleyball, band, jazz band, concert choir, show choir, Solo & Ensemble competitions, and the National Honor Society. She was also enrolled in accelerated classes, served as a class officer, and held a part-time job throughout high school. FACT OF THE MONTH

This spring Alex was awarded the college's Lucy Smith Morris Shakespeare Prize in English for excellent achievement in the study of Shakespeare.

"I can't imagine that it gets much better than Ripon," says Alex. "Everyone seems to look out for everyone else; everyone is wonderfully supportive. It is the best kind of learning environment, and that's something that I hope to be able to create in my own classroom."

Alex says that there are many reasons that he has chosen to pursue teaching. "Of course I want to help people learn, but

there's more to it than that. I am fascinated by all kinds of subject areas. I have a deep love for learning. As a teacher, I want to instill that love for learning in others," he says.

When Alex is not participating in college activities, he spends time volunteering in the community. He helped to direct an area high-school theater production last year, and in addition, he has dedicated his time to the student-started Have a Catch program, in which members of the baseball team visit a Ripon elementary school each week and play catch with fourth- and fifth-grade students, many

from single parent homes. The players help the children not only with baseball skills, but with study skills as well.

"I know how much what we do means to the kids," says Alex of his involvement with Have a Catch. "But I'm quite certain they don't know how much it means to us. It's kids and baseball - two things I love. Once a week, Have a Catch is the best part of my day."

Thanks to financial aid like the Wisconsin Tuition Grant, future generations of middle- and high-school students will be able to benefit from Alex's enthusiasm.
